Poppy Earrings Tutorial

Materials and tools

Bead A - Miyuki Seeds	15-402 Opaque White	(128 approx. 1g)
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Bead B - Miyuki Seeds 15-94201 Duracoat Galvanised Silver(184 approx. 1g)

Bead C - Miyuki Seeds 15-401 Opaque Black (95 approx. 1g)

Bead D - Miyuki Seeds 15-408 Opaque Red (422 approx. 1.5g)

2 x Earwires

2 x wire guards

Size 11 or 12 Beading Needle

Beading thread of your choice - I used Nymo B in white to ensure that the white beads retain their bright shade

Scissors or a thread burner

To complete this tutorial you should know the following techniques:

- How to create a Warped Square
- Even count and odd-count peyote with Step-Ups at the end of each row / Herringbone Increase
- How to shape edges and how to follow a word chart and diagrams
- How to securely add a new length of thread and how to secure working thread before cutting it

Project Notes

Please read through the instructions before starting this project:

- Mind your tension the tighter you bead the more structured/stiffer the finished square will be
- Each finished earring measures 35mm across
- This pattern is worked clockwise with Step-Ups at the first of the Herringbone Increase created in each row



Step 1 - Create a Warped Square

- 1. Thread your needle with about 1.5m of your favourite beading thread
- 2. Next follow all the steps below:


Row 1 (4A) **Row 2:** (CC) x 4 Row 3 (CC), 1C, x 4 Row 4 (DD), 2C, x 4 Row 5 (DD), 1D, 1C, 1D, x 4 Row 6 (DD), 4D, x 4 Row 7 (DD), 1C, 1A, 1D, 1A, 1C, x 4 Row 8 (BB), 6D, x 4 Row 9 (AA), 3D, 1C, 3D, x 4 **Row 10** (2*), 1B, 1D, 1B, 2D, 1B, 1D, 1B, x 4



Next Step - Creating edges at the 4 sides of the square

- 3. We will now work each of the 4 edges separately, working back and forth
- 4. To start **Row 11**, we will reverse direction
 - Row 11 1A, 7D, 1A
 - Row 12 1B, 6D, 1B
 - Row 13 1A, 2B, 3D, 2B, 1A
 - Row 14 1A, 1B, 4D, 1B, 1A
 - Row 15 1A, 1B, 1D, 1B, 1D, 1B, 1A
 - Row 16 1A, 4B, 1A
 - Row 17 1A, 1B, 1A, 1B, 1A
 - Row 18 4A
 - Row 19 1A, 1*, 1A
- 5. Pull the thread tightly when beading Rows 18 and 19, as this will help to curve the edge of the petal
- 6. Now repeat the above steps for **Rows 11** through **19** three more times.










Next step - Ear wire loop

- 7. On completing the 4th edge, weave back through the edge beads until you are exiting out of the 11th A bead, counting from right or 7th counting from left.
- 8. Next pick up **5A** and weave through the **5th** bead when counting in the opposite direction.
- 9. Weave back through all the beads again to secure them to the beaded poppy.
- 10. Secure the thread before cutting it.
- 11. Pick up your ear wire and open the loop then slip it through the loop on the poppy before closing the loop.
- 12. Now repeat all of the above steps to create your second poppy earring.



Et voila! You are done!
